McBride Shifted To New Quarters

McBride has moved!

For longer-term alums, the scene was both eerie and sad as they arrived for the AA meeting Tuesday evening, January 9, and found the unit dark and barren; the door locked.

As is customary for such actions, there was no advance announcement that Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital was "downsizing," a euphimism for budget-cutting consolidation of programs and services.

Visiters were surprised, then, to learn that patients in both the Dewey Center and McBride programs are now housed in a single 30-bed wing previously occupied by the Sleyster Unit.

At the former Dewey facility, where utilization had been down, renovation and possible conversion to other uses is being considered.

Despite the physical consolidation, the two treatment programs will remain separate, according to hospital officials. There will be little or no change in group and other therapy activities.

Increased emphasis on outpatient programs, plus the market dilution produced by the recent opening of several new mental health and chemical dependency programs in the Milwaukee area, forced the downsizing, the hospital said.

McBride currently operates outpatient programs in Wauwatosa and Madison.

All beds at McBride were occupied at the time of the move, and it was noted that consolidation will eliminate the need to house excess patients on other units.

Hospital occupancy levels in most departments have slipped over the past year, officials said, and the total bed compliment is being reduced from about 145 to just over 100.

The 15-bed McBride wing, opened in January, 1985, will remain closed indefinitely.

No changes are anticipated at the two Recovery Houses.

be reviewed by a committee representing both the Foundation and the treatment team.

Established last November as a conduit for Alumni gratitude, the trust fund is seen as the first major step toward a truly meaningful role for the McBride Foundation.

Those who have found recovery as a rebuilding of their own lives can now help others to follow their path.

Recovery House residency, often cited as the most beneficial phase of treatment, is generally not covered, or only partially so, by insurance.

The Endowment Fund will serve as an additional, if not last, resort for individuals in temporary financial distress.

Other, even more ambitious, uses for the fund will be explored as resources permit.

Conducting "Rap Sessions" with inpatients and Recovery House residents is probably the most noticed, but alumni volunteer work can take many forms.

Workers are also needed, for example, to help out with the varied events and programs organized by the association throughout the year.

Anyone wishing to gain the personal rewards of such activities is invited to register at the Alumni table at the Tuesday night AA meetings.

Three rap sessions are held each week on the unit and once a month at the Recovery House. Alums meeting certain criteria, such as a year of sobriety, are eligible to participate.

Route To Game Night

Locating Brown Deer Park, the site of Game Night 90, ought to be a snap. Bordering Good Hope Road (7200 North), the park's entrance is at 7600 North Range Line Road (the equivalent of North 25th St.).
