backbone of AA and, as such, is an unofficial "credo" for the McBride Alumni. As the repository of the Twelve Steps, it contains "everything you need to know -- and then some" about the simple program that has brought and preserved recovery for alcoholics and other addicts worldwide.

We discovered it early, and continue to read or hear it on a

regular basis. Though past McBride Retreats have often focused on the 12 Steps, the theme for this year's Spring event May 31-June 2 draws upon the slightly broader topic, and should provide a bit more flexibility.

"It's a little different, but still in keeping with our general format," explained Retreat Chairperson Diane Weber, noting that the weekend programs have traditionally focused on the Steps in the spring and the Promises for the winter gathering. "I think everyone will have something to think about and to share with others," she said.

Set for the weekend following Memorial Day, the schedule remains the same as for previous retreats, with sign-in starting at about 5 p.m. on Friday, and dinner at 6:30. Closing generally has

participants heading home at about noon on Sunday.

Our beautiful lakeside location at Perpetual Help Retreat Center near Oconomowoc is a short 20 to 30-minute drive from Milwaukee and, no matter what the weather, has proven to be ideal for both renewal and relaxation.

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Outpatient Alum Named to Board

For the first time, a "graduate" of the McBride outpatient program has been named to the Alumni Board of Directors.

Marian Catania, who began treatment in the summer of 1988, was appointed to fill the vacancy created when John Hanson asked to step down because of increasing job demands.

Marian has been an enthusiastic participant in Alumni functions and said she was anxious to share that spirit and interest with others, especially former outpatients who may be unfamiliar with the many opportunities for ongoing fellowship.

"I think, sometimes, that people feel left out because they weren't inpatients," she said. "That's unfortunate. There's so much to be gained by socializing and volunteering and all of the other Alumni activities that strengthen recovery."

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Alumni Fund Goes To Work

An Alumni dream has come true. Gratitude and generosity can now bear fruit in a meaningful way.

In the works for over a year, the McBride Alumni Endowment Fund has become operational and, effective May 1, financial assistance will be available to help open the doors to Herrington House post-primary treatment for those who might otherwise miss the opportunity.

Though still limited in scope, and with a few details still to be worked out, the low-interest loan program is open to qualifying patients whose own resources fall short of the significant fees for residency in what were formerly known as "Recovery Houses" on the Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital campus. (The two facilities were renamed in honor of Dr. Roland Herrington following his retirement early this year.)

Since the term will expire at the close of the fiscal year, Marian said she plans to seek election to a full term on the Board at the annual Alumni business meeting in September.

Hanson, who served as Board president from 1988 through 1990, was completing his second two-year term as a director.

Hospital Opens New Residence

There's a new facility at the Milwaukee Psych campus and, though not part of McBride, it represents yet another dimension to the continuum of treatment and recovery.

Called a "three-quarter house," the community residence is located across the street from the hospital on Dewey Avenue and is called Alumni House. (The "alumni" title is generic; there is no affiliation with the McBride Alumni Association.)

As opposed to a "recovery house," there is no direct supervision, no structured programs and no hospital-oriented services. There are, however, rigid standards for sobriety and recovery and other rules governing lifestyle and behavior.

Completion of a formal treatment program is a prerequisite, but it need not have been at Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital.

Endowment Funds Now Available

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Criteria, such as need and sincere commitment along with stipulated repayment ability, have been developed in cooperation with the ADMC professional staff. Applications must be submitted to Roger Glazer at Herrington House and, following an ADMC screening, recommendations will be acted upon by a special committee of the Alumni Board of Directors. Application forms and other materials are currently being produced.

Since it was established in November, 1989, the Endowment Fund has attracted contributions totalling nearly \$13,000, which have been placed in trust to underwrite the project. At present, the funds are available only in the form of loans, with outright grants under consideration for the future, if and when the fund is large enough.

Donations, of course, are still urgently needed. Fully tax deductible, checks should be made out to The McBride Foundation and designated for the Endowment Fund, as opposed to regular Alumni donations (a suggestion of at least \$10.00 per year, also tax-deductible, in lieu of traditional dues). At the discretion of the Board, operating fund surpluses are transferred to the Endowment at the close of the fiscal year.
