For Dr. Roland Herrington, it was a night to remember.

Marinated in love and appreciation, basted with fond (and some not-so-fond) memories, spiced with good-natured ribbing and peppered with anecdote after rollicking anecdote, he was done to a golden glow by the time the evening drew to a close.

"I've had a wonderful time," he sighed. "God bless vou all."

Nearly 200 friends, most of them McBride Alumni, were on hand for the "Herrington Roast" at the Sheraton Mayfair Hotel January 4, and the menu was loaded with emotion, fun, tribute and appreciation. It was a touching farewell as "Roland H.," also known as the "Iron Marshmallow," stepped into at least semiretirement after a career that has changed the lives of many of those attending.

Dr. Herrington first announced his retirement last summer, but his departure has been a lingering thing. Now, with a residence in Palm Springs, California, and a vow to do many of the

'Herrington Houses' To Honor Founder

"Rec I, II & III" will soon be known as Herrington I, II and III.

The renaming of McBride's three recovery houses has been approved by the Board of Directors of Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital, according to Hospital President Jerry Schley.

"It's a fitting honor," he said. "After all, the recovery house program was Dr. Herrington's idea, and it has proven to be a tremendous success in helping patients on the way to recovery."

Details and an official date for the renaming are still being worked out.

Endowment Passes \$12,000

Thanks in large part to donations spurred by the "Herrington Roast," the McBride Alumni Endowment Fund has surged past the \$12,000 mark.

As part of the tribute to Dr. Herrington, Board Treasurer Ken Zimmerman announced at the dinner that the \$10,000 milestone had been reached, and subsequent contributions pushed the total still higher. He said that implementation of the Alumni's assistance program is now assured.

Established just over a year ago, the Endowment Fund is designed to provide financial help for McBride patients who might otherwise be unable to comply with staff recommendations for Recovery House residency as part of their treatment.

Qualification and eligibility criteria, as well as application and repayment procedures, are now being reviewed by the Board, and low- or no-interest loans and/or grants will soon be available. They have been delayed while the fund was allowed to reach a sustainable level.

(Continued From Page 1) things he has never had time for, he conceded that the move is, perhaps, "official at last." (But there was a promise to "keep in touch with what is going on at McBride.")

One of the most moving testimonial ribbings came from Dr. Alan W., who now lives in Rhode Island and who was the first physician to benefit from Roland's guidance when he shifted his specialty to addictive medicine.

"Moving" in another sense was the hilarious skit, part of it set to music, performed by McBride Alum Susan A., who vividly recalled her first impressions of Dr. Herrington and his treatment program.

But they were just two of 20 "roasters" who helped the cofounder of McBride relive his gratifying life before and after struggling into recovery.

Roland's sponsor was on hand to tell about the diverse challenges he has faced in providing counsel and support; Dr. Benzer passed along dubious greetings from a "mutual friend" ("He really wrote this.. Really, he did."), and Roger Glazer joined Gail Robison in recounting the joys of working in the ADMC environment under Dr. Herrington's less-thancomforting direction.

Milwaukee Psych President Jerry Schley presented Roland with the now-replaced "Reserved for Dr. Herrington" parking lot sign, with hopes that it would command the same privileges and respect somewhere in Palm Springs.

Symbolic of the similar ones dropped off at McBride on a weekly basis by many former patients over the years, there was a small, personalized glass container filled with an unknown liquid.

Roland even got a sweatshirt identifying him, in large letters, as a "Body-Building Champ." For more formal occasions, he received a handpainted tie, complete with curvaceous bathing beauty.

And, of course, he got hugs and hugs and hugs.

There were moments of tears -- both mirthful and heart-wrenching -- and there was reminiscing. Reaching deep into the past, it revealed a side of Dr. Herrington many were unaware of. It was goodnatured, warm and fun. It was a good time for all, and for all, it was memorable.

Bunch Moves North To Holiday Inn For Sunday Brunch

Forced from its former "quarters" by a restructuring of the restaurant, the monthly "Brunch With The McBride Bunch" has moved to a new location.

"We've been anxious to put the money to this great use," said Board President Chis Giese. "We knew it would take time to get started, but it looks like, at last, we will begin seeing some gratifying results, and some grateful patients, in the near future."

Surplus funds are transferred to the Endowment Fund at the end of the fiscal year, August 31. Last summer, \$1,000 was added to the fund from this source.

Brown Deer Park Easy To Locate

A Point Worth Pondering

Alumni fellowship -- the availability of our many social and sharing events, and the ongoing relationships with others nurtured through frequent contacts -- is often taken for granted by those residing in the Milwaukee area.

For those Alums who traveled to get here, and who returned to distant homes following treatment, however, proximity is something missed and even envied.

"I know there's nothing here comparable to it (McBride camaraderie)," wrote Bob A., of Ann Arbor, Michigan. "In fact, I know of no such group anywhere in the country."

"I must confess to occasional feelings of wistfulness that I am so far away and unable to share in such a supportive program in a direct way," he wrote. "But I do have a sense of sharing, nevertheless, because your communications (The Moving Finger) convey the message, as well as the feelings of grateful sobriety."

Participation in Dr. Herrington's retirement roast was especially missed. "His expertise and personhood saved my life and will continue to enrich it to the end of my days," Bob declared. "For that, of course, I shall always be thankful."

As a McBride patient six years ago, Bob made many friends in the Milwaukee area, and his letter carried a greeting to all of them.
