Back in the spring of 2007 I reported on the new Herrington by the lake project. This project is the construction of a new building on the shores of Upper Nashotah Lake that will house the Herrington program.

On Sept. 22 ground was broken. The projected time frame for completion is eleven months.

The new Herrington building will be about 18,000 sq. feet with 19/20 beds with a private bathroom/shower for each bedroom. Each bedroom will have views of the lake.

This building will be a "green" environmentally designed building, the first of its kind in Waukesha County. It will take full advantage of the area's beauty and serenity.

Some of the unique features include a rooftop garden and 12 step meditation path, quiet and private gathering spaces for study and reflection for the residents, attractive meeting areas for family sessions and a very warm fireplace in the main room.

There will be a commercial grade kitchen with a chef. Dining areas, recreation and art therapy rooms and more will have views overlooking the lake.

The new HRC will physically embody the hope, help and healing services that we all have come to know as the best available.

The time has come where the HRC's physical plant will equal the talents and expertise of its staff.

I am particularly humbled to say that I am on the committee that is in charge of fund raising for the new HRC. If any of you would like to know how you can help please contact me personally for details.

In closing, it is with great humility and gratefulness that I wish all of you a joyous holiday season. It is because of the HRC and the fellowship that I am able to do so.

I have continued to work as a therapist since that time and work at Rogers Hospital in West Allis, WI. I was invited to be a board member on the Herrington-McBride Alumni Board again and was happy to be able to continue to serve in this way and be connected again with some of those persons who have become a part of my life in recovery. My name is Mickey Gabbert, and I am a grateful alcoholic/addict. I entered into sobriety on August 1, 1978. (Yes, over thirty years ago.) I have continued in sobriety since that date; and have had the opportunity to carry the message throughout the United States . Approximately two years after first getting sober, I entered into a counselor training program in Minneapolis, Minnesota. In addition, I had the opportunity to work at the original Minnesota Medical Model treatment center while going to school. That is where I met Sandy, who eventually became my wife. (She trained me in as a technician at St. Mary's Rehab Center in Minneapolis). I have directed and managed inpatient, outpatient, and residential programs in Iowa, California, and Wisconsin; and have been able to observe the significant changes in the provision of care since 1978. (I am truly grateful I was able to enter inpatient treatment as I don't think I would have made it in an outpatient program.) I have three children and six grandchildren. My oldest child (Kevin) is an employee of the State of Iowa, working in the AODA field. My second oldest child, (Jennifer) is currently in nurses training. My youngest is currently following her dream in musical theatre at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. I continue in my educational endeavors and am currently enrolled in an Organizational

Leadership program at Aurora University , George Williams Campus, Williams Bay, Wisconsin. I truly love school; and my ultimate dream is to be an educator during my retirement years-educating individuals on the disease of addiction and the treatment of this illness. I have been employed by Rogers Hospital for almost ten years and have been identified as the AODA Services Manager, for all levels of care, for the past several years. This includes the Herrington Recovery Center . a medical technologist. We lived in France for two years while I was a military physician and then moved back to Milwaukee for my specialty training.

We moved to our current home in Wauwatosa in 1968. I have been in a private Ob-Gyn practice in Wauwatosa and Brookfield since 1968. We have three children, a physician, a skilled machinist and a lawyer. We also have three grandsons. My alcoholism started gradually in my 20's and 30's and progressed until an intervention in 1990. I entered formal therapy in January 1991 and have enjoyed continued sobriety since then. I have been involved with the alumni association since 1996. Following treatment on the McBride unit of Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital in July of 1988, it soon became clear to me that this was one disease I was not going to be able to "fix" by myself. I needed meetings, a sponsor, and loving and supportive friends in the program—not just for a year or two, but for my lifetime. Sharing my experience, strength and hope through RAPS to in- and outpatients at RMH West Allis, and serving on the HMAA Board as Treasurer and coordinator of the annual Winter Retreat have given me wonderful opportunities not only to give back, but also to strengthen my own program and to continue to move forward with my life. *Mary Krall*

I have been sober since July 08, 2006. I was in Herrington approximately 2.5 months. When I left Herrington and began my sobriety journey, I made a commitment to myself that I was going to give back to AA and Herrington as much as possible. Since leaving Herrington I have sponsored Herrington residents, been a RAP Speaker and talked at the Family Program. I continue to work with sponsees and remain very active in all of the Rogers AA meetings. I made a decision that I would like to become a HRC board member about a year into my sobriety. I feel that it is important to give back to a program that has given me so much. I believe that the relationships that I form with the Herrington residents along with my own experiences, makes it beneficial to know what they are going through and what they are dealing with. This allows me to make recommendations to the board from a hands on approach when needed.
