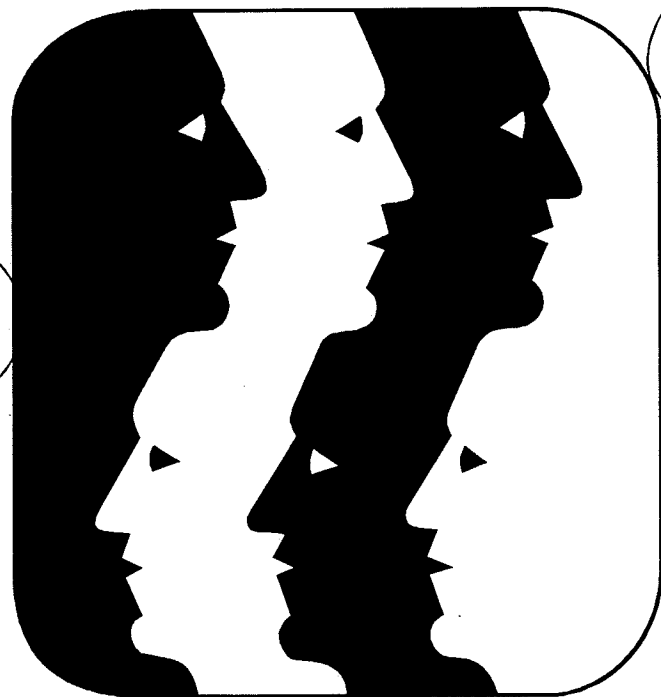

Space Limited; Register Early Summer Retreat Has Familiar Theme

Like old shoes or a pair of scruffy bedroom slippers, the familiar slogans of AA are time-worn, often taken for granted and sometimes ridiculed.

But they sure are comfortable.

Sayings like "Easy Does It. Let Go; Let God." And, of course, "One Day At A Time."

Contrary to most slogans, however, they seem to gain meaning and strength with frequent usage. For some, they even become powerful mottos to be proudly displayed as plaques or bumper stickers.

At the very least, they provide food for thought and stimulus for meditation and discussion -- and that's the stuff that retreats are made of.

"The Slogans of AA: Words? Or Words To Live By?"

That's the theme for the Fourth Annual McBride Alumni Summer Retreat set for June 1-3, and reservations are already coming in.

"It's a little different twist; one we can really think and talk about," said Diane Weber, chairperson of this year's event.

McBride Alumni retreats, held twice each year at the scenic Perpetual Help Retreat Center on the shore of Crooked Lake near Oconomowoc, have a reputation for excellence.

"Each one seems to be better than the previous one," Diane said. "It's always a tough act to follow. But then I guess it's like recovery -- it keeps getting better."

Past retreats have focused on the 12 Steps and on the promises and on subjects such as the Serenity Prayer. No matter what the theme, however, the weekends have proved inspirational and have never failed to draw unanimous praise from those attending.

The registration this year remains at \$80.00, which includes all costs: Two nights' lodging at the idyllic lakeside center, five delicious meals plus snacks and other incidentals. Round-the-clock coffee is provided and a soda machine is available. Program details and a map will be mailed as part of your reservation confirmation.

As with past retreats, the weekend program will feature discussion leaders from among those attending, followed by small group meetings. The time is your own, however, and there is ample opportunity for reading, reflection or other quiet time activity.

Program Offered Just For Children

When alcoholism or chemical dependency strikes a family, it is often the children who have the greatest difficulty understanding, and -- importantly -- coping.

The "Children's Discovery Group," a special division of the Outpatient Child and Adolescent Program of Milwaukee Psychiatric Hospital is designed with this problem in mind.
